On June 22, 2023, the City Council unanimously directed staff to take the necessary steps to transition to five single-member districts prior to the November 2024 Election.


#### **Public Education & Outreach Plan**

On August 24, 2023, the City Council unanimously adopted the Redistricting Public Education and Outreach Plan

## Purpose of this Public Hearing

- To inform the public about the redistricting process and to hear from the community on what factors should be taken into consideration while creating district maps.
- The public is requested to provide input regarding communities of interest and other local factors to be considered while drafting district maps.

# Existing Two-District Map



### District Map Drawing Criteria

1. Federal Laws

**Equal Population** 

**Federal Voting Rights Act** 

No Racial Gerrymandering

2. California Criteria (in priority order):

1. Geographically contiguous

2. Minimize division of neighborhoods and "communities of interest" (Socioeconomic geographic areas that should be kept together)

3. Easily identifiable boundaries

**4. Compact** (Do not bypass one group of people to get to a more distant group of people)

**Prohibited:** "Shall not favor or discriminate against a political party."

3. Other Traditional Redistricting Principles

Respect voters' choice / avoid unnecessary pairing of incumbents

**Future Population Growth** 



#### **Communities of Interest**

Possible features defining communities of interest might include, but are not limited to:



School attendance areas



Areas around parks and other neighborhood landmarks



Natural dividing lines such as major roads, hills, and highways



Common issues, neighorhood activities, or legislative/election concerns



Shared demographic information, such as:

- Similar levels of income, education, or linguistic isolation
- Languages spoken at home
- Single-family and multi-family housing unit areas

**DEADLINE:** November 1st to submit a draft map for City Council consideration.

September 28, at 4:30 pm: Public Hearing to hear public input on factors to be considered while drafting maps.

2 October 4 and 16, at 5 pm: Map Drawing Workshops

3 November 1: Deadline to submit maps

November 16, at 4:30 pm: Public Hearing for presentation of all maps and request that the City Council select "focus maps"

#### **Public Comment Questions & Answers**

- 1.The City is creating a five single-member district electoral system. However, District 1 was readjusted following the 2020 Census and is expected to stay intact. Therefore, this is primarily an exercise in dividing District 2 into four smaller districts.
- 2. The CVRA requires that the City "implement an effective district-based system that provides the protected class the opportunity to elect candidates of its choice from single-member districts." Consistent with the CVRA and City's settlement agreement, District I was drawn to maximize Latino voting age population (44.81%) and was population re-balanced following the 2020 Census. As noted in past meetings, in the demographer's preliminary best efforts it was discovered that any adjustments to D-I results in "diluting" Latino voting age population (reducing their percentage in the district), which risks violating the CVRA and settlement agreement. This could render the map vulnerable to legal challenge. If the demographer or a community map drawer can create a map which improves the Latino voting age population in District I, it is possible such map could be adopted.

#### **Public Comment Questions & Answers**

3. The prioritization of the criteria is clearly outlined in state law, but the definitions of those criteria are subject to considerable local interpretation and application. What qualifies as a 'neighborhood' or a 'community of interest' is highly subjective (that is why the law requires public hearings to gather public input on those definitions); what qualifies as an 'easily understood boundary' could be debatable; and what counts as 'bypassing one group of people to get to another group of people' can be highly influenced by local factors and geography. Clear failure to honor these priorities could render the map vulnerable to legal challenge.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Conduct the public hearing to receive public input on district boundaries.

Receive and file a report on the redistricting process and permissible criteria to be considered to redraw district boundaries.
